Land Transport Rules - Setting of Speed Limits 2024 - Consequential Amendments

Proposal

- This paper proposes that the Cabinet Legislation Committee (the Committee) authorise the submission to the Executive Council of the following Orders in Council
 - 1.1 Land Transport (Register of Land Transport Records Speed Limits)
 Amendment Regulations 2024 (the Transport Records Order);
 - 1.2 Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees)
 Regulations Revocation Order 2024 (the Regional Transport
 Committees Order), (together, the Orders).
- Subject to Cabinet agreement for the submission of the Orders to the Executive Council, I also intend to sign the Land Transport (Road User) Amendment Rule 2024 (the Road User Amendment Rule).

Executive Summary

- On 28 September 2024, Usigned the Land Transport Rule Setting of Speed Limits 2024 (the 2024 Speed Rule), which comes into force on 30 October 2024. The signing of the 2024 Speed Rule met the Government's commitment to sign the 2024 Speed Rule by 30 September 2024.
- To assist the effective implementation of the 2024 Speed Rule consequential amendments are required to existing rules and regulations.
- I am proposing to make these amendments through two Orders in Council.
- The Transport Records Order will amend the Land Transport (Register of Land Transport Records Speed Limits) Regulations 2022 to reference the 2024 Speed Rule and delete reference to the previous rule.
- 7 The Regional Transport Committees Order will revoke the Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees) Regulations 2022 as the Regulations are no longer required to implement the 2024 Speed Rule.
- Subject to Cabinet agreement of these Orders in Council I intend to sign the Land Transport (Road User) Amendment Rule 2024 to amend the Land Transport (Road User) Rule 2004 to reference the 2024 Speed Rule and delete reference to the previous rule.

As the Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees)
Regulations 2022 were made by Order in Council they need to be revoked by
Order in Council. Ministry of Transport officials investigated with the
Parliamentary Counsel Office if amendments to the Land Transport (Register
of Land Transport Records – Speed Limits) Regulations 2022 could be made
by the Chief Parliamentary Counsel under the editorial changes sections
(Sections 86 and 87) of the Legislation Act 2019. However, the Parliamentary
Counsel Office has advised that the changes are also required to be made by
Order in Council.

Policy

- On 17 September 2024, the Cabinet Expenditure and Regulatory Review Committee considered the paper title Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2024 post consultation report back. Cabinet agreed to me as Minister of Transport instructing the Parliamentary Counsel Office (PCO) to draft the consequential amendments [CAB-24-MIN-0369 refers].
- The paper I am presenting today complements that proposal and seeks agreement to progress consequential amendments through two Orders in Council. These amend the Land Transport (Register of Land Transport Records Speed Limits) Regulations 2022 and revokes the Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees) Regulations 2022.
- Further consequential amendment is required through the Land Transport (Road User) Amendment Rule 2024 which I intend to sign subject to Cabinet agreement to progress the amendment and revocation proposed in this paper.
- The amendments are minor, changing the year from 2022 to 2024 after references to the Speed Rule.
- The revocation of the Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees) Regulations 2022 (RTC Regulations) is required as the option for Regional Transport Committees to set speed management plans has been removed from the 2024 Speed Rule following consultation as Road Controlling Authorities (RCAs) considered it more appropriate to have collaboration between neighbouring RCAs. As a result of this, the RTC Regulations are now redundant.

Timing and the 28-day rule

- The Order in Council to amend the Land Transport (Register of Land Transport Records Speed Limits) Regulations 2022 will come into force on 30 October 2024.
- The Order in Council to revoke the Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees) Regulations 2022 will come into force on 30 October 2024.

- The Land Transport (Road User) Amendment Rule 2024 (the Amendment Rule), which I intend to sign subject to Cabinet agreement regarding the Orders in Council, will come into force on 30 October 2024.
- A waiver of the 28-day rule is sought for the Orders and for the Road User Amendment Rule on the basis that the Orders and the Amendment Rule have little or no effect on the public.

Compliance

- 19 The regulations comply with each of the following:
 - 19.1 the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi
 - 19.2 the rights and freedoms contained in the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990 or the Human Rights Act 1993
 - 19.3 the principles and guidelines set out in the Privacy Act 2020
 - 19.4 relevant international standards and obligations
 - 19.5 the Legislation Guidelines (2021 editions), which are maintained by the Legislation Design and Advisory Committee
- The Transport Records Order is made under sections 167(1) and 168AAA of the Land Transport Act 1998 on the advice and with the consent of the Executive Council.
- The Regional Transport Committees Order is made under section 109 of the Land Transport Management Act 2003 on the advice and with the consent of the Executive Council and on my recommendation as Minister of Transport.

Regulations Review Committee

There are no grounds for the Regulations Review Committee to draw the Orders to the attention of the House of Representative under Standing Order 327.

Certification by Parliamentary Counsel

Parliamentary Counsel Office has certified the Orders as being in order for submission to the Executive Council, except that the Orders will come into force earlier than the 28th day after their notification in the Gazette.

Impact Analysis

The Ministry of Transport undertook a Regulatory Impact Assessment for the 2024 Speed Rule. It was considered by the Cabinet Expenditure and Regulatory Review Committee when policy decisions were taken on the 2024 Speed Rule and consequential amendments.

Publicity

I do not intend to announce these changes as they are administrative in nature.

Proactive Release

I intend to proactively release this paper within 30 days of this Cabinet meeting, subject to appropriate redactions.

Consultation

27 Ministerial consultation has occurred on the proposed amendments, but departmental consultation was not considered necessary given the minor nature of the consequential amendments and because full departmental consultation occurred prior to signing the 2024 Speed Rule.

Recommendations


I recommend that the Cabinet Legislation Committee

- note that in September 2024, Cabinet considered the outcomes of the public consultation on the draft Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2024 (the 2024 Speed Rule);
- note that the Land Transport (Register of Land Transport Records Speed Limits) Amendment Regulations 2024, the Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees) Regulations Revocation Order 2024 and the Land Transport (Road User) Amendment Rule 2024 give effect to the decision referred to in recommendation 1;
- 3 **authorise** the submission to the Executive Council of the:
 - 3.1 Land Transport (Register of Land Transport Records Speed Limits)
 Amendment Regulations 2024;
 - 3.2 Land Transport Management (Regional Transport Committees) Regulations Revocation Order 2024 (together the Orders);
- 4 **agree** to waive the 28-day rule so the Orders and the Road User Amendment Rule can come into force following publication in the Gazette on 30 October 2024;
- 5 **note** that, subject to the Orders being agreed, the Minister will sign the Land Transport (Road User) Amendment Rule 2024 which will come into force on 30 October 2024.


